It brings us together, and diverts from the short term worries and frustrations, and reminds us happier times. Henry came to Debenham in 1982 with his wife Judith and their two youngsters, Lucy and Nick, and served as country vicar and subsequently rector of Debenham and its surrounding parishes. He proved to be a "larger than life" character with boundless energy and enthusiasm, yet blessed with the greatest empathy and care for all who came to know him. Not only did the church flourish in his hands, but Henry became part of so many aspects of life in and around Debenham in those days – the schools, the Fire Brigade, country pursuits, community events, etc. etc.

In 1991 he moved on to continue his calling in new pastures in Marlborough in Wiltshire. Someone never to be forgotten by those who knew him.
